



Hepatitis C: Treatment and Elimination ECHO Opportunity

Clinicians and their teams are cordially invited to participate in the Hepatitis C: Treatment and Elimination ECHO program, funded by SAMHSA State Opioid Response (SOR) and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Viral Hepatitis Prevention grant funding. ECHO is a tele-mentoring program that uses videoconferencing technology to combine brief expert presentations with interactive and practical case presentations from participants. The overall goal of ECHO programming is to build new capacity for care at the community level.

This **16 session ECHO series** will help build or improve systems of care that effectively treat hepatitis C in the primary care setting. Topics will include:

- Diagnosis, screening, and treatment of hepatitis B & C
- Identifying populations most at-risk for transmission of hepatitis C
- Prevention of transmission and re-infection
- Assessing fibrosis and cirrhosis
- Designing a team-based care approach to hepatitis C treatment
- Recognizing liver-related complications

Benefits of participation include:

- No cost to you or your facility
- No cost to you continuing medical education (CME) credits*
- The opportunity to present your tough patient or system-level cases and receive feedback from a multidisciplinary team of specialists and your peers
- Share and learn with other clinicians, practices, and a multidisciplinary team of specialists on how to:
 - o Build a treatment program at the community level
 - o Develop systems, protocols, and policies to support treatment
 - o Cultivate leadership buy-in

Sessions for this cohort will occur via a virtual meeting space every other Thursdays from 12:00-1:00 p.m. beginning Thursday, October 17 2019 through June 11, 2020.

We will select **15-20 clinical teams** to participate based on interest, geographic distribution throughout Oregon, and ability to commit to the sessions. Clinical teams will include at least one prescribing clinician (MD, DO, PA, NP) and up to two other supporting staff who are in a position to develop new systems and processes to support care delivery. Other supporting staff could include a pharmacist, practice manager, quality improvement manager, behavioral health specialist, nurse care manager, or medical assistant.
